Meet the Poet

Edgar Allan Poe

Edgar Allan Poe was born in Boston, Massachusetts on January 19, 1809. Both of his parents died before he was three years old. As a result, Poe was sent to live with foster parents in Virginia. Poe's relationship with his foster father was difficult throughout his entire life. Poe's foster mother died from tuberculosis (a lung disease), and her death helped Poe and his foster father to patch up their relationship for a brief time. Their relationship worsened, however, and when Poe was expelled from the United States Military Academy at West Point, he moved in with his aunt and her daughter, Virginia. Poe and Virginia fell in love and married in 1836. Poe worked as a poet, editor, and short story writer but struggled with alcoholism and depression. This worsened when Virginia contracted tuberculosis and died in 1847. Poe died in Baltimore, Maryland on October 7, 1849.
